- Rhyming Words two or more words that have the same or similar ending sounds.
 - Examples goat, boat, float,
 - When you are figuring out if two words rhyme use your ears to listen as you say the words. If they sound the same, they rhyme.
 - Sequence of Events beginning, middle, and end of a story.
 - Retell the story so that the events are in order as they happen.
 - CVC Words consonant, vowel, consonant words
 - Examples: cat, jet, run

WRITING
